

- Action Plan:

- Introduce new UG programs in emerging areas (e.g., Environmental Science, Data Science, Rural Development) by 2026.
- Expand vocational courses (e.g., Digital Marketing, Renewable Energy, Organic Farming) in collaboration with NSDC and local industries.
- Integrate Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) fully by 2024, with electives in entrepreneurship, ethics, and sustainability.
- Develop micro-credentials and certificate courses under the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) framework.
- Conduct annual curriculum reviews with stakeholder feedback (industry, alumni, students).

6.2 Teaching, Learning, and Evaluation

- Objective: Enhance teaching quality, student engagement, and evaluation transparency.
- Action Plan:
- Train 100% faculty in ICT-based pedagogy and NEP-aligned teaching methods by 2025.
- Establish a Learning Management System (LMS) for blended learning by 2024.
- Increase ICT-enabled classrooms to 10 by 2027 and ensure 100% Wi-Fi coverage.
- Introduce mentorship programs and remedial classes for slow learners.
- Implement continuous internal evaluation (CIE) with 40% weightage on project-based assessments.

6.3 Research, Innovations, and Extension

- Objective: Foster a research culture and strengthen community engagement.
- Action Plan:

- Organize annual national/international seminars on rural development and cultural heritage.

- Build a boys' hostel and expand women's hostel capacity by 2026.
- Further fortify the Career Counselling and Placement Cell by 2024 to be more effective and result-oriented.

- Objective: Enhance student employability, progression, and holistic development.
- Action Plan:



- Launch a Skill Development Hub to train 500 students annually in employable skills.
- Strengthen alumni engagement through an Alumni Association and annual meets.

- Provide coaching for competitive exams (e.g., UPSC, APSC, NET) by 2025.
- Promote extracurricular activities through NCC, NSS, and the rest of the relevant wings of the college.

- Implement an Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) system for administrative automation by 2025.

- Seek autonomous status by 2030 to enhance academic flexibility.


7.1 Timeline and Milestones
